Dear Parishioners,

The week of January 18-25 is a special week for Christians around the world as it is celebrated as the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. The theme for this year is Do good; seek justice. The theme selected by the Minnesota Council of Churches USA, in light of the racial injustice dominant there and in other parts of the world—taken from the first chapter of the Book of Isaiah. The theme reflects the prophet's concern for the oppressed who suffer from injustice and inequality fed by hypocrisy that leads to disunity. He teaches that God requires righteousness and justice from all of us, to create the peace and unity that God desires. These virtues originate in God's love for all, and racism runs counter to this vision. Isaiah's challenge to do good and seek justice together applies equally to us today.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is the Church's attempt to practice what Our Lord prayed for us on the night before he died - *That they may all be one as you, Father, are in me and I in you, that they also may be in us, that the world may believe that you sent me.* (John 17:21). The universal week of prayer for unity encourages Christians of all denominations to reflect on Jesus' desire for unity of the church and to pray that this unity may soon be realized.

Last week, we, the pastors of the various Christian Churches on Danforth Avenue, met together to plan for our annual Good Friday walk, as a way of showing our unity and our desire for peace and justice. I have heard from parishioners, who were part this experience in the past, that this walk has been a powerful symbol of celebrating our unity in spite of our differences. More details on this will follow. During this Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, let us pray for greater unity and solidarity among all Christians, called to do good and to seek justice.

As mentioned earlier this month, the Holy Name parish Truth and Reconciliation group is pleased to host a Dialogue Circle series in partnership with the Jesuit Forum for Social Faith and Justice. This is one way we are being invited to enter into the spirit of Canada's Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action as a faith community.

<u>Gathering Times and Sessions from "Listening To Indigenous Voices"</u>

This series of small group dialogues will begin in February and meet once a month for a total of four gatherings.

- Sunday, February 26th Session 5 - Ties of Kinship
- 2. Sunday, March 26th Session 2 - A Tale of Two Communities
- 3. Sunday, April 23rd -Session 7 - Killing the Indian in the Child
- 4. Sunday, May 21st Session 10 - Pathways to Decolonization

Each session is stand-alone so it is not necessary to register for all four sessions.

We will meet in the basement hall after the 10 am Mass.

Each session will last approx 90 minutes. There will be a separate version of each of these sessions geared to children aged 5-12 on each of the four Sundays. If you register your children, we strongly suggest that you also register for the adult sessions.
